The Katal Center for Health, Equity, and Justice is working with the Open Society Foundations to bring an international delegation to the U.S. to meet with local groups and community members and discuss the devastating impact of the War on Drugs at the local, national, and international level.

The tour is visiting five cities: Atlanta, Denver, Seattle, Chicago, and New York City. At each site, local organizers and international delegates will connect local reform efforts to the upcoming United Nations General Assembly Special Session (UNGASS) in New York City on April 19-21, where nations will discuss global drug policies.

Atlanta is the first stop on the UNGASS International Delegation Tour. In the United States, the South imposes some of the most punitive drug laws and collateral consequences affecting people with criminal histories and their families. And Southern-based organizations are building powerful community movements capable of winning justice in the South and across the nation.


